WRAPS Sends Letter to Village of Croton –on- Hudson

Below you will see a copy of the letter that was sent April 29, 2009 to the Journal News, Croton-Cortlandt Gazette, the Village Board, and their P and R Advisory Board from the WRAPS Board.

May 13, 2009

An Open Letter to the Mayor Leo Wiegman and the Croton-on-Hudson Trustees:

The Westchester Recreation and Park Society (WRAPS) Executive Board and its membership, just became aware of the abolishment of the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation position and the relocation of the Parks Department into the Department of Public Works. Parks and recreation services are of vital importance to any community and are best served with a Superintendent position with the Parks Department under his/her purview.

Parks and recreation services create community among residents and are often stated as one of the top reasons people decide to live in a particular municipality. Our parks and programs provide opportunities for socialization, fitness, healthy lifestyles, and the experience of nature. Recreation programs are also credited with creating self esteem and team work among youth, and for providing opportunities for youth, keeping them out of the criminal justice system. Simply stated, recreation resources improve the quality of life for all residents.

- Youth program titled "Recycled Masterpieces." Children will create works of art out of household items that have finished serving their original purpose. They will learn interesting and important facts about preserving our natural resources. Parents will learn easy tips to go green, and lessen the footprint we make. Children must be accompanied by an adult.
- Utilize extra copies of flyers, etc. for scrap paper
- Community Days have County Shred Mobile and Veggie Mobile on site. Have various environmental groups involved in event providing information (Green Yorktown, Sierra Club, Environmental Conservation Department, NYC Department of Environmental Protection, Yorktown Conservation Board)
- Create list serve or make use of school enews to notify residents of important information, flyers, etc.
- Utilize computers and email more frequently instead of hard copy memos, notices, etc. to department staff
- In 2006 Yorktown established an Open Space & Conservation District. \$30 per lot assessed each year as part of Town taxes to purchase open space
- New Rochelle Marina shrink wrap recycling program for boats & special sewer pump out for boats so sewage in not released into the sound

A special thanks to everyone on the committee who accepted this challenge and looked at there own community and neighboring communities to develop such an extensive list of sustainable activities. Also thanks to those department heads who completed the committee's on-line survey. It's been a rewarding journey taking on this challenge on behalf of the members of WRAPS.

We hope the information shared can help each department in Westchester County "think green and be greener".

PLAYLAND PREMIERES NEW PAY-ONE-PRICE ADMISSION IN 2009 ~ by Joe Stout

Playland Park in Rye opened on Saturday,

May 9 with our new "pay one price" admission, which allows for unlimited rides all day for patrons who purchase Fun Band wristbands. Like we would do for any other major operational change, we planned for the best but prepared for challenges. I'm happy to report that so far the new system is working well and patrons are discovering that Playland still offers outstanding value for their recreational dollar.

Fun Bands are sold for \$25 for Westchester residents and \$30 for non-residents. Twilight Fun Bands, sold after 6 p.m., are \$20 for Westchester residents and \$25 for non-residents. Junior Fund Bands, which allow unlimited free access to select park rides for children under 36 inches tall when accompanied by an adult with a Fun Band, are free with the purchase of any adult Fun Band (maximum two Junior Fun bands per adult Fun Band.) Nonriders entering the amusement section of the park to walk, watch the park's entertainment or as chaperones pay a modest entrance fee of \$3 for Westchester residents and \$5 for non-residents. If they later choose to go on rides, holders of non-rider wristband can upgrade to a Fun Band during their visit or use leftover Fun Card points from the prior season or purchases ride cards at \$1 a point.

All Westchester-resident Fun Band purchases also cover the fees for miniature golf and Playland Beach and Pool; visitors from outside the county pay extra for mini-golf and beach and pool entrance. Schedules for these amenities vary; check <u>www.RyePlayland.org</u> for hours.

Acceptable proof of Westchester County residency is a Westchester County Park Pass; a valid New York State driver's license or NYSissued non-driver I.D.; a Westchester County school photo I.D. or a credit card with ZIP code verification.

As in the past, there is *no charg*e for going to the boardwalk (including Big Band concerts and boardwalk arcades and shops), the pier, the ³/₄-mile Seaside Walk, museum, Fountain Plaza and its adjacent food court, fireworks viewing, lake boating or Read Wildlife Sanctuary.

Parking fees have been lowered this year to \$4 per car weekdays and \$5 weekends and holidays.
